

SUPERVISING COUNTERDRUG OPERATIONS

Narcotics supervisors often have no narcotics experience at the beginning of their assignment. This tuition-free, 24-hour Multijurisdictional Counterdrug Task Force Training course will address common issues narcotics supervisors are faced with and provide different options to handle various situations. Instructor Joe Beliveau began his law enforcement career in June of 1990 with one of the largest law enforcement agencies in Illinois. Joe has been involved in thousands of undercover operations involving narcotics, firearms, car thefts, murder for hires, etc. He is also recognized as an expert by Illinois Courts as well as Federal Court of the Southern District of Illinois.

Instructor Tyson Melvin began his law enforcement career with the Benton Police Department in Benton, Illinois in 1996 where he worked as a patrolman for 6 years. He was then hired by one of the largest law enforcement agencies in Illinois. Upon graduating from the academy, Tyson was assigned to patrol. In 2005, he was assigned to investigations where he has since held positions on the Methamphetamine Response Team, Gangs & Gun Unit, proactive street detail in the St. Louis Metro East Area, and with the Metro East Homicide Unit. Tyson is also a range instructor, control and arrest tactics instructor, juvenile officer, member of the use of force review board, and a member of Major Case Squad of Metropolitan St. Louis.
